Families are crucial in fostering a child's language and literacy skills from infancy. A child's comprehension and learning abilities are significantly shaped by the value their family places on literacy. Starting school with strong literacy skills correlates with overall academic success, not solely in language-related subjects. Early literacy encompasses diverse activities like music, storytelling, and drawing, highlighting the importance of varied forms of communication. Reading to children from an early age is invaluable. Oral language proficiency strongly predicts reading and writing skills, emphasizing the importance of frequent conversations with children. Engaging children in conversations during everyday activities and outings enriches their vocabulary and understanding of the world. Activities such as sharing rhymes, discussing family history, exploring picture books, and playing vocabulary games enhance language development. Regular interaction with children through talking, listening, and engaging in various activities supports their language acquisition and confidence.

Functions of school council

The key functions of school council with regard to the school are:

- to establish the broad direction and vision of the school within the school's community
- to arrange for the supply of:
 - goods
 - services
 - facilities
 - materials
 - equipment
- other things or matters required for the conduct of the school, including the provision of preschool programs
- to raise funds for school related purposes
- to regulate and facilitate the after-hours use of the school premises and grounds
- to exercise a general oversight of the school buildings and grounds and ensure they are kept in good order and condition
- to provide for the cleaning and sanitary services that are necessary for the school
- to ensure that all money coming into the hands of the council is expended for proper purposes relating to the school
- to provide meals and refreshments for the staff and students of the school and make charges for those meals or refreshments
- to inform itself and take into account any views of the school community for the purpose of making decisions in regard to the school and the students at the school
- to generally stimulate interest in the school in the wider community
- to prepare the School Strategic Plan and review the Annual Implementation Plan to be signed by the president and the principal
- to report annually (the Annual Report) to the school community and to the department on:
 - the school's financial activities
 - the School Strategic Plan, and
 - any other matters that are determined by the Minister
- to manage the hire, licence and shared use of school facilities
- to determine the dates for the school's student-free days:
 - in accordance with the number of student-free days each calendar year specified by the Secretary of the department
- to perform any other function or duty, or to exercise any power conferred or imposed on the council by or under:
 - the Education and Training Reform Act 2006, or
 - any regulations made under that Act
 - a Ministerial Order made, or direction issued, by the Minister under the Education and Training Reform Act.

 Executive Officer and the school council president) is available on <u>School Councils Composition and Officer</u>

AROUND THE ROOMS

Grades 3-6—Term 1

Each student in Years 3-6 has a reading record sheet in a plastic document wallet which has been distributed last week. As part of our homework routine, we would like all students to read regularly each week and fill in their record sheet. This is their responsibility, but we ask that parents check in on how they are going and help us monitor how often they are reading. Students are allowed to fill in their records at school and at home.

Whatever reading is done on a particular day is recorded as 1 day. So, if they do some at home and some at school, they add the pages onto that same day. Students will receive certificates and a prize at each marker point. E.g. 25nights, 50, 75, 100 etc. **Reading records are to be at school every Wednesday for Mrs C to have a look!** Keeping them in school bags reduces the chance of them being lost.

Specialist Classes

During PE lessons, students have been preparing for our athletics events. We have been perfecting our skill in long jump, high jump, sprints running, distance running, discus/bean bag distance and shot put/ bean bag accuracy. Those of you who attended our sports day on Monday will have seen our students in action and witnessed their focus and determination. Congratulations to our house captains and school leaders for helping to make our Sports Day a great success.

Recent art classes have focused on the preparation of costumes for the Boolarra Folk Festival. Students made bright and colourful hats to wear during the parade. It was fabulous to see the excitement students showed for this task and even more fabulous to see the hats being worn proudly at the Folk Festival. Students created some amazing hats and worked really hard during each lesson. This week we begin making hands for our Boolarra Primary School tree. Students create a hand each year with a picture of themselves. These hands then make the "leaves" of our Boolarra Primary School tree. The tree is located in the corridor opposite the office. There are already many beautiful hands on display from previous years which we encourage you to check out.

In science we are learning about forces. Our F/1/2 students have been learning about the difference between moving and still objects and exploring how the forces of push and pull can be used to make objects move. Our next focus will be exploring how factors such as size and shape change the way an object moves. 3/4/5/6 students conducted investigations about forces using balloons. They explored how the force push and pull can be used to make a balloon move, change its speed or direction and change its shape. Our next focus will be about contact force and exploring how the strength of the force applied can change the distance and speed and object moves.

SCHOOLS' PRIVACY POLICY

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Schools' Privacy Policy informs the school community that information about students can be shared to fulfil the schools' core functions of educating and supporting our students.

The Schools' Privacy Policy establishes a clarified 'need to know' framework, where school staff share information about students with other staff who need to know as part of their role. This is consistent with Victorian privacy law.

Who does the policy apply to?

The policy applies to all central, regional and school staff including principals, teachers, visiting teachers, administration staff, social workers, wellbeing staff, youth workers, nurses, Student Support Service officers (SSSOs) and all other allied health practitioners. This means the 'need to know' framework below also applies to all school staff, whether employees, service providers (contractors) and agents (whether paid or unpaid) of the Department.

Need to know

All school staff can, and must, share information about a student with other staff who 'need to know' that information to enable the school to:

- educate the student (including to plan for individual needs or address barriers to learning)
- support the student's social and emotional wellbeing and health
- fulfil legal obligations, including to:
 - take reasonable steps to reduce the risk of reasonably foreseeable harm to the

- student, other students, staff or visitors (duty of care)
- make reasonable adjustments for a student's disability (anti-discrimination law)
- provide a safe and secure workplace (occupational health and safety law).

Please note: the Child and Family Violence Information Sharing Schemes allow prescribed organisations to share confidential information with each other to promote the wellbeing or safety of children, or to assess or manage family violence risk. Victorian schools and a range of other Victorian services fall under these schemes. For more information, refer to:

Who decides who 'needs to know'?

Subject to the principal's direction, each staff member decides who needs to know specific, relevant information about a student, based on the 'need to know' framework

Sharing relevant information with other staff who 'need to know' is very different from idle conversation or gossip.

School staff are entrusted with a large amount of important information about students. Staff must treat all such personal and health information sensitively and respectfully, and not share it other than on this 'need to know' basis.

What information and records can be transferred to a student's next school?

When a student has been accepted at, and is transferring to or from, another school (Victorian government, non-government and/or interstate), the current school transfers information about the student to the new school. This information may include copies of the student's school records, including any health, wellbeing or safety related information.

Parental consent is not required to transfer this information between Victorian government schools but must be obtained when the student is transferring to or from Victorian non-government schools, including Catholic schools or interstate schools.





Principals (or authorised representatives) determine what information to provide to the next school based on the 'need to know' framework:

What information does the next school 'need to know' to properly educate or support the student, and fulfil the school's legal obligations?

'NEED TO KNOW' framework

Duty of care

A school's duty of care to students means that a principal or other member of the leadership team needs to know about any reasonably foreseeable risk of harm to anyone because of the student's behaviour, disability, family circumstances or any other relevant circumstances related to the student.

So, for example, if there is a reasonably foreseeable risk to anyone because the student:

- displays violent behaviours
- is a victim or perpetrator of bullying, assault or age-inappropriate sexualised behaviours
- has emotional, wellbeing or self-harm issues

then staff must tell the principal (or other member of the school leadership team).

The principal will then share relevant information with any other staff member that needs to know because they work with, or supervise, the student. Staff must provide the principal with enough relevant information required to adequately fulfil their own duty of care – so that the principal can fulfil their duty of care too.

Importantly, when there is a reasonably foreseeable risk of harm, staff should act on that information and share the information with other staff who 'need to know', even if the student or parent asks that information not be shared.

Anti-discrimination law

A school's obligation to provide reasonable adjustments for students with disabilities (regardless of whether they are eligible under the Program for Students with Disabilities) means that relevant information about a student's disability and their needs must be shared with all staff who work with or supervise that student.

This is required to enable the school to make properly informed decisions about what adjustments are reasonable, and then to implement those adjustments.

This may also be required to meet the duty of care to that student (for example, a student with a medical condition who may require treatment).

This means that relevant information must be shared with all staff who work with or supervise that student, to enable them to:

- understand the student's disability and how it affects their learning and social or emotional wellbeing
- implement reasonable adjustments at school, including understanding all recommendations made by the student's treating practitioners.

The relevant school policies are followed by school staff when engaging with parents, such as wellbeing and behaviour policies. Go to your school's website for relevant policies.




ANNOUNCEMENT, CHANGES TO FRIDAY LUNCH ORDERS


